This original documentary tells the little-known story of four outstanding and brave

African American men – Kenny Washington, Woody Strode, Marion Motley and Bill Willis – who broke the color barrier in pro football in 1946, one year before Jackie Robinson and Branch Rickey were credited with integrating Major League Baseball.



On **Tuesday, February 17, at 6 PM,** the CLBC will host a screening at the Century Theatres Downtown Plaza on the film "Selma" a chronicle of Martin Luther King Jr.'s campaign to secure equal voting rights via an epic march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama in 1965.
